THE CHINESE CADETS OUR ALLIED AIRMEN

When the flags of Allied nations wave together in the air of freedom, we will well remember having shared our flight training with an outstanding group of Chinese Nationals—natives of a great country that has borne the brunt of war for over a decade.

Although fewer in numbers than our class, the Chinese gave us full realization of military courtesy and discipline. Their conduct was a tribute to the United States of America and the Republic of China.

Overcoming the handicap of language, the Chinese cadets took identical training with the exception of necessary English courses. Other than this, our training lives were similar.

While we were preparing for pre-flight training without having seen an airplane, the Chinese were logging 60 hours of flight time in India. This was to assure Chinese and American Lend Lease officials that each cadet would be suited for the full training.

Upon graduation at Marfa they received commissions as "sub-lieutenants" in the Chinese Air Force as well as wings from our AAF and their CAF.

Our mutual objective is clearly defined. We have a strong hope that our paths will cross once again and we will fly wing to wing in combat as we have at Marfa Army Air Field.
